Presidents Report

Jim Tebrake

Overview

The 2015-2016 season was another very successful season for the Nepean Blue Devils Basketball Association. I would like to thank all the players, coaches and volunteers for your effort, time and hard work. As you will see from the various reports – a lot was accomplished in 2015-2016. We fielded the most teams we have ever fielded this year – at the recreational and competitive level. Our teams were very successful at all levels of play. We had more volunteers this year than any other year – and we ended the year with on great party.

Accomplishments

- This year Nepean continued to establish itself as one of the premier basketball clubs in Ontario. Not only are we one of the largest clubs but we also had an incredibly successful year on the court. From our Novice Girls team taking gold in the EOBA's to our Midget Girls team finishing 4th in the province to our Bantam Boys selects team taking the Division 3 EOBA bantam gold. Whether you looked at the WEBL standings, EOBA standings, or OBA standings you were more likely than not to find a Nepean team high in the standings. We can be very proud of our athletes.
- The club was able to enter into a sponsorship agreement with Donnelly Automotive Group. This sponsorship agreement allowed us to keep our registration fees in check and enable the club to offer financial assistance to help families with the cost of playing basketball.
- The club hosted the Midget Boys and Midget Girls Ontario Cup organizing over 300 games and hosting around 130 teams over the course of two weekends.
- The club continued to evolve its selects program furthering the goal of providing a challenging basketball environment for all our players.
- The club was able to make a substantial investment in its recreational uniforms, replacing the majority of the uniforms this year.

Goals and Recommendations

• Finding facilities and coaches continues to be the main challenge we face. An important goal this year will be to find ways to better utilize the gym space that we have. This means that everyone will need to work together so that all our players have the



opportunity to grow and develop. Currently we do have some availability on Saturday's – we are going to look at creative ways teams can share weekend gym times so that we can alleviate some of the pressure on our week night time slots. Coaches will also need to learn to work together or occasionally tailor their practices to a smaller gym.

- We have already started recruiting coaches for the 2016-2017 season. The club has been exploring the idea mentor coaches who can help new coaches gain the experience and confidence they need to run a team. We encourage everyone to see how they may be able to help out in this area. The club is committed to supporting our new and existing coaches. You are the backbone of the organization.
- The club will continue to invest in shot clocks and game clocks in order to ensure that our teams (and the parents who operate them) have access to appropriate and well-functioning equipment.
- The club is looking into changing its fee structure so that there is increased transparency in our registration fees and parents are aware of the full cost of playing basketball. This means we are looking into incorporating the full competitive team fee (including the costs of tournaments and Ontario cup registration) into the competitive registration fee.
- The club has decided to field both provincial travelling and local travelling teams (where numbers and coaches warrant) for the 2016-2017 season. The local travelling teams will receive 2 hours of practice a week and will play in the local competitive (EOBA) league. They can also participate in local competitive tournaments. The provincial travelling teams will receive 4 hours of practice time each week and will participate in the local competitive league (EOBA) as well as out of town leagues and tournaments. We feel this change will permit the club to meet the diverse needs of our growing basketball community.
- The club has committed to, when possible, run minor and major competitive teams at each age group / gender.
- The club will once again bid for the Ontario Cup and will play an active role in the oversight and operations of the Eastern Ontario Basketball League and West-End Basketball League.



VP Finance Report

Overview

Please see the attached complete financial statements for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2016.

The Association's net revenue from registration fees for FY16 was \$183,827 (FY15 - \$168,386). This annual increase of \$15,441 is a direct result of a growing number of players and teams registered in our programs. Total gross revenue for FY16 was \$197,449 (FY15 - \$170,484). This increase is largely the result of a major sponsorship agreement with Donnelly Auto Group secured during the year. The agreement provides for \$30,000 of total sponsorship revenue for the Association over 3 years (with extension options at \$10,000 per annum). Pursuant to the agreement, \$10,000 was received during the fiscal year and was recognized as revenue.

Given the increased registration fees and sponsorship revenue, the Board elected to make significant investments in uniforms (\$37,491) and equipment (\$6,290) during the year. This investment represented the full balance of the Association's net assets restricted for capital assets; however, the Board has since replenished the capital asset fund with a further \$10,000 (FY15 - \$20,000).

The deficiency of revenues over expenses for the year was \$5,013 (FY15 – surplus of \$15,531). The Board approved a modest operating deficit for the year in order to keep registration fees as static as possible while the school boards make drastic changes to fees charged for gym time.

Accomplishments

Significant financial accomplishments in FY16 include:

- Secured a major sponsorship agreement with Donnelly Auto Group, valued at over \$30,000,
- Invested significantly in new uniforms and equipment,
- Prepared and continuously updated the annual budget to monitor/control revenues and expenditures,
- Reviewed all financial records and presented monthly financial results/positions to the board, and
- Prepared complete financial statements to ensure transparency with the membership



Updates on Last Year's Goals and Recommendations

- Identify opportunities to reinvest capital to improve the Association's services for the members Accomplished
- Re-evaluate membership fees in consideration of the following:
 - Catholic School Board will now be charging an hourly fee for gym use,
 - Potential for a significant private sponsorship (no yet finalized), and
 - FY15 realized a significant surplus that needs to be reduced. Generally kept membership fees static and realized a modest deficit indicating sustainable fiscal operations
- Continue to prepare complete financial statements to ensure transparency with the membership Accomplished

Goals and Recommendations

Goals for FY17 include:

- Find a qualified successor to transition the role of VP Finance
- Re-evaluate membership fees in consideration of the continued increase in facilities costs
- Continue to prepare complete financial statements to ensure transparency with the membership

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended March 31, 2016 (Unaudited)

1. Basis of presentation:

The recognition, measurement, presentation and disclosure principles in these financial statements may not be in accordance with the requirements of any of the financial reporting frameworks in the CPA Canada Handbook - Accounting.

2. Change of reporting period:

The draft financial statements presented at the Annual General Meeting of Members on June 24, 2014 had a fiscal year -end date of June 30, 2014. In order to be able to present final financial statements to the membership, and to be consistent with other non-profit organizations, the Association elected to change its fiscal year-end date to March 31 as part of its continuance under Canada's new Not-For-Profit Corporations Act on August 15, 2014. The comparative figures shown in these financial statements have been restated to reflect this change.

VP Development

Eric Johannsen

Overview

During the 2015-16 season there were 251 boys and girls in the NBBA novice and atom developmental programs, coached by a dedicated group of almost 50 parents, junior coaches and other volunteers who improved player skills and fundamentals over the year (81% of mid-season overall coaching evaluations were excellent and 12% were good). Here is the break-down by program,

- Novice beginner (ages 6-7) 34 boys, 16 girls
- Novice intermediate (ages 8-9) 33 boys, 31 girls
- Novice competitive (ages 8-9) 14 boys, 12 girls
- Atom (ages 10-11) 64 boys, 47 girls

The novice beginner and intermediate programs ran each Saturday at Farley Mowat public school.

The novice competitive teams had weeknight practices twice a week, played in the respective atom house leagues, and in the brand-new EOBA novice boys and girls leagues and championships.

The atom programs ran on Saturdays at ACES (boys) and Cedarview (girls), with 5 boys teams and 4 girls teams. The boys alternated Saturday practices and house-league games, whereas the girls had a one-hour game every Saturday, preceded by a one-hour practice shared by the two teams. House-league games are refereed by our junior club officials (who are trained and assigned games by Steve Kenny). Both leagues had Christmas and year-end tournaments (including novice comp teams).

Accomplishments

- recruited coaches as needed, and program coordinators for both for atom house leagues
- the club hosted an Open House in September to recruit development players
- coordinated start-up and sort-out dates, gym allocation
- conducted a clinic for development coaches in October
- continued a policy of having junior coaches at the atom and novice levels, there were 8 this year (down from 13 the previous year)
- Steve Nash Youth Basketball and Mega Hoops programs were used in novice beginner and intermediate programs (lesson plans available on www.hoopsplaybook.ca)
- ran atom boys and atom girls skills sessions
- year-end medals provided to all novice and atom players
- coached novice comp girls

Update on Last Year's Goals and Recommendations

- continue to improve player recruitment at the novice level, e.g. program publicity, open house
 an Open House was held
- provide player, parent and coaching codes of conduct at the beginning of the season



- done as part of the registration process
- offer the opportunity for novice advanced and/or atom participation in WEBL
 - the novice comp teams played in the EOBA
- assess whether to run the Mega Hoops program (or possibly the Jr. NBA program) for both novice beginner and intermediate programs
 - both programs were too expensive to out-source, but development coaches used lesson plans
- again host a Mega Hoops clinic (encourage registered coaches to show up, registration is capped)
- an internal clinic was held for development coaches
- conduct at least one additional internal clinic for development coaches
- continue to emphasize skill development and fundamentals, including motor skills
 weekly lesson plans (and www.hoopsplaybook.ca) cover motor skills
- emphasize that coaches should attend practices and games or ensure there is back-up
 - atom convenors ran a tight ship
- look to re-balance atom teams if needed, and encourage strong players to try competitive
- the atom boys convenor and coaches reviewed one team and decided against rebalancing
- assess other aspects of the atom program formats, e.g., weekly games, pre-game practices, additional skill sessions
 - the boys house league decided on one format, the girls used a different one
 - boys and girls skill sessions were held
- assess whether league information on the club website could be improved
 - atom house league schedules were easily accessed on the club website
- assess ways to get more development players involved in year-end club activities (e.g. a banquet)
- much better attendance of development players at the year-end banquet
- Other goals and recommendations (no specific actions taken)
- consider novice "cohort" practices, combining novice intermediate and advanced players
- improve the completion rate for PRCs (police record checks)
- continue to develop and encourage a junior coaches program, and assess the structure

Goals and Recommendations

- verify the size distribution of development-program t-shirts (continue to have numbers on the back)
- offer regular weeknight skill / practice sessions for atom boys and girls
- consider whether to offer a consistent, pre-determined format for atom girls and atom boys house leagues (e.g. combined practice and game each week)
- ensure that atom coach bags include pinnies, cones, and possibly a pump
- gym permit requests include atom holiday and year-end tournaments
- order year-end development-program medals using a consistent format (colour, inscriptions)
- develop and encourage junior coaches, increase numbers
- improved system for providing coaches apparel



Technical Director

Eric Johannsen

Overview

During the 2015-16 season, the Nepean Blue Devils had over 125 coaches at the development, recreational, and competitive levels.

Accomplishments

- coached the U10 and U19 girls comp teams
- ran try-out sessions for novice girls, atom boys and girls, and bantam boys competitive programs
- conducted a clinic for development coaches in October
- conducted skill sessions for atom boys and atom girls during the season
- currently running off-season skill sessions for older players
- conducted a clinic for rec and comp coaches in February on dribble-motion and drills
- invited coaches to attend two U19 girls practices
- split the manuals for the Steve Nash Youth Basketball and Mega Hoops FUNdamentals programs into individual chapters and lesson plans, made them available on www.hoopsplaybook.ca
- maintained an email distribution list of coaches in all programs
- forwarded coaching newsletters and other information to coaches
- periodic emails to coaches on a variety of coaching issues
- advised coaches about the NBBA Playbook on Google Drive, which was updated with coaching documents throughout the season
- continued to update www.hoopsplaybook.ca with other new systems and drills
- administered the mid-season online coaching evaluation forms, summarized the results with a comparison to last year, shared them with club coaches 75% of all mid-season evaluations were "excellent" (vs. 78% last year), and 14% "good" (vs. 18%)

- contribute to development of a club playing-time policy

VP Recreational Boys Program

Overview

The Boys Recreation Program consisted of 17 NBBA teams playing in 3 different divisions. The bantam boys played in our own division of 8 teams. This allowed for more players to register at this age and teams practiced once a week, played once a week, had a year end tournament and also had a chance to play on a Selects Team which comprised of some extra practices, games and tournaments for the players looking to test the competitive waters. The midget boys teams played in the West End Basketball League (WEBL) as did the Junior Boys.

Bantam Boys (8 teams), Midget Boys (6 teams) and Junior Boys (3 teams).

This allowed for approximately 204 players to enjoy the game of basketball twice a week (for one two hour practice and one regulation game.)

Associations in the WEBL: Nepean, Kanata, Goulbourn, Ottawa Shooting Stars, Ottawa South, Naismith, Brockville, Kemptville, Valley Pride and Elgin.

We had a very successful season participating in the WEBL and overall coaching was good.

Accomplishments

- NBBA teams came away with very good results from our WEBL competitions:
 - Bantam Boys: NBBA Team Jamer wins GOLD
 - <u>Midget Boys : NBBA Team Macdonald wins GOLD</u>
 - Junior Boys: NBBA Team Tamming wins SILVER
 - Attended practices and games, including beginning of year sort outs and the Year End Tournaments, at all levels in the WEBL.
 This was used to view and evaluate: players/coaches/referees/score keepers/league programs/parents
 Feedback used to make improvements in 2016-17 season.
 - Annual Christmas Midget Boys All Star Game, where NBBA Midget Boys take on an All Star Team from the WEBL Midget Boys, a huge and fun success.
 - As VP of Recreation, I Chaired the WEBL (West End Basketball Association) beginning of year meetings where the rules and regulations are established and I took responsibility of writing the WEBL Guidelines for all the WEBL leagues. Also



introduced a post season meeting with all Association VP's and conveners to recap the year and plan for next year's leagues. Transitioning role to Neil Talbot, VP Recreation NBBA Girls.

- Very strong talent pool of coaches in Nepean and saw some very good development and results. Special mention goes to Ian Mackinnon who coached the Bantam Selects all year. Won two exciting tournaments. Player development was excellent for the 12 players in this program, chosen from our in-house recreation boy's bantam teams.
- Year End Tournaments at all 3 levels were hosted by Nepean. Very successful and well organized. Some great basketball was played. Feedback from parents, coaches and players was all very positive.
- Established and maintained a great relationship with our OVBABO (referee association) ensuring all scheduling done for all league games for the WEBL league as well as tracking and making sure all officials were payed on a timely basis.
- Ensuring all WEBL teams played minimum games required as set out in the WEBL Guidelines. (all teams played 16 regular season games plus a year end tournament where teams played up to an additional 5 games).
- Volunteer score keeping program seemed to lose its drive as the season progressed. There were only a handful doing the score keeping at the end of the season. I found a whole new crop myself by going directly to the high schools in Barrhaven and this seemed to add more consistent score keepers and time keepers, especially at the Year End Tournaments.
- Helped with equipment for the NBBA, balls/uniforms: for recreation and competitive players, includes ordering, sizing, and picking up and looking for future options.
- Convened the Midget Boys Recreation Division, as well as help the bantam boys division with refereeing, monitoring its pilot progress, develop the referees. Sharon Ruiter stood out as by far the best referee in the division as conveyed by the coaches and convenor, Curtis Blair.



Goals and Recommendations

Some suggestions and recommendations for next year include:

- Continue to be lead organization for the WEBL. Neil Talbot would be ideal person to continue improving this league for bantam to junior girls and boys.
- Reach out in August 2016 to the coaches (bantam to junior) from 2015/16 season and get their intentions for the 2016-17 season. This would include atom boys development coaches moving up to bantam level.
- Continue with the Midget Boys All Star Game and introduce this event to even the bantam and junior boys level.
- New structure being discussed at the competitive level but still see an opportunity to run bantam and midget "Selects" teams at the boys recreation levels.
- To continue to support the Year End Banquet format and help grow attendance.
- Continue to work with the VP Competitive before the season begins to establish practice nights, tournament dates, comp tri-meets etc to avoid schedule changes.
- Continue to Improve the Junior Boys Recreational Program, and to make sure we keep going in the right direction. Nepean hosted this division on Sundays this past season at ACES. (Games at: 9am, 10:30am, 12pm and 1:30pm). This worked very well and was well received. *Please note that there are only so many OVBABO referees available on Saturdays and the referee assignor did inform me that the Sunday Junior Boys League in the WEBL was easy to accommodate due to it being on a Sunday.
- Convenors: you will need to find convenors for the 3 levels for the 2016-17 season. Please contact Curtis Blair and Kevin McWhinnie to see their intentions for convening the bantam boys and junior boys divisions, respectfully.
- Gym sharing at the midget and junior boys levels is the way to go providing the gym is big enough. (cannot have 2 teams sharing small gyms).
- Recommend the Bantam Boys Division still be run in-house.
- Referees at the Bantam Boys levels should be more experienced. Would recommend using OVBABO certified referees if available.

VP Recreational Girls Program

Neil Talbot

Overview

Initially Registered: 78 girls at bantam, 52 girls at midget, 35 girls at junior. Several parents from other associations contacted me during this year's start up as their associations were having difficulty offering up spots for their players - OSBA folded a bantam rec team and OSS only offered only 1 team for girls rec at both the bantam and midget levels.

Enrolment - Bantam girls 6 teams, Midget girls 4 teams, and 3 Junior girls teams.

Of these teams, 4 Bantam teams, 3 midget teams and 3 Junior teams participated in the WEBL. Two bantam teams and 2 midget teams played in the EOBA. One of the midget teams participated in both the WEBL and the EOBA.

Bantam girls won gold for both WEBL tier 1 and tier 2. Midget girls won gold at WEBL tier 1. Junior Girls won silver and bronze at WEBL. At bantam we have a particularly strong and keen group and a sizable portion of these players will be bantam again next season.

Bantam Selects team Talbot won Silver at the EOBA Div 3 year end tournament.

Midget Selects team Forzley won Bronze at the EOBA Div 3 year end tournament.

Midget Selects team Frame won Gold at the OBA Div 6 Ontario Cup tournament.

Year in Summary

In an attempt to create an intermediate level of participation the NBBA created "selects" teams. Parents signed their player up for these levels. The majority of those that signed up were placed on these teams and some were "not ready" for this level and were returned to the traditional rec program. The idea was to have these selects teams play in a tiered WEBL league. The leagues were tiered and, for the most part, the bantam WEBL worked well with this structure. The midget WEBL had some issues with the lack of parity in the league. This was addressed this season and will be continued to be addressed for next season. We are hopeful that Gatineau will



be joining us next season in the midget WEBL to create a better distribution of teams among the tiers.

Some Rec teams migrated to play solely in the EOBA as they were too strong for the WEBL. These teams participated well at the EOBA level and, in general, parents were pleased at the move to the EOBA. This process has led to the proposal of EOBA or "Local" Competitive teams for next season.

Getting volunteers is always an issue at the Rec level. We were low on volunteers at the bantam and midget age. We used jr coaches at bantam and midget. There were some parental concerns. I would say that these coaches did a good job over the season and if we didn't use these jr coaches we would have had to turn away 22-24 participants. We were fortunate to have had three coaching teams in place for the jr girls - all were experienced coaches with a number of years of volunteering for the NBBA.

A call for volunteers was put out at the end of the season. After putting out this all-call for volunteers at the end of the 2015-2016 Rec seasons, we have only received 5 confirmations ,for all of girls Rec, for coaches , head and assistant, for next season (as of June 1st). From a planning perspective, this disappointing at best.

Some questions have come up concerning forming our own internal house league for bantam. At this stage gym time would be a limiting issue. As well leaving the WEBL could limit the league that we presently participate in.

Recommendations for Next Season

Continue to contribute to the WEBL. As one of the "big" providers for the WEBL we will need to look at a new management structure for the WEBL as Jim Turner will be leaving at the end of the season.

The WEBL should use qualified refs for all the ages. Right now they are using student refs at bantam and, from feedback and personal observations, the players would be better served with a higher level of officiating.

Bring in a convenor for the midget girls WEBL league that Nepean hosts. Provide administrative support for this individual as well as any structural advice and disciplinary issue support.

Designate a coordinator for each level. This season I coordinated bantam and midget and Dave Daze did the Junior program. Next season other coaches will co-ordinate midget and bantam to help increase the involvement of the membership.



The "new selects" model should be moved into "Local" or EOBA Competitive and play in the EOBA. The NBBA has the resources to sustain this process with respect to gym time as these teams operate as Rec teams with regards to practice time. As always, the challenge will be to get coaching for this level.

The WEBL membership will be asked about tiering the WEBL again. If the associations that contribute more than one team per level are not on board then Nepean should return to a balanced teams structure for their WEBL teams. Jr girls would experience no changes as the numbers in the WEBL don't support tiering.

For registration next season the NBBA should utilize the waitlist. Spots for the various levels should be opened conservatively as the amount of volunteers for coaching and managing teams is always an issue. This should be communicated to the membership in the spring or early summer of this year. Given the input I have received ,so far in this off season, the NBBA should consider opening 24 spots at each of the girls levels and see how many volunteers come forward before we open any more spots from the waitlist.

The NBBA should link Recreational Level coaches to an age specific basic skills progression that should be worked on in practice for the season to develop both individual and team skills (Basketball Canada's LTDP). Perhaps look at a Google Classroom with this information on it and provide embedded videos for a visual representation of drills and skills.

Increase coach enrollment in our clinical sessions offered by the technical director.

The NBBA should actively recruit coaches for the Rec level from the University/College aged adults. A payment incentive should be used to bring these coaches in. Recruitment of young women to coach the girls should be a priority so these coaches may also act a gender role models.



VP Competitive Report

Kelly Milne

Overview

The Competitive Program consisted of 13 NBBA teams playing in 13 different age divisions within the Eastern Ontario Basketball Association (EOBA) and the Ontario Basketball Association (OBA). 11 NBBA teams participated in the OBA's Ontario Cups and 12 teams participated in the EOBA Championships.

Teams competed in the following age divisions:

- > Minor Atom Girls (did not compete in Ontario Cup)
- > Major Atom Girls
- > Minor Atom Boys (did not compete in Ontario Cup)
- > Major Atom Boys
- > Minor Bantam Girls (competed in Major Bantam Girls division)
- ➤ Major Bantam Girls
- Minor Bantam Boys
- > Major Bantam Boys
- ➤ Minor Midget Girls
- > Major Midget Girls
- Minor Midget Boys
- > Major Midget Boys
- > Junior Girls

Teams competed in the EOBA league that consisted up to 14 league games. Teams participated in tournaments across the province of Ontario, Quebec and the state of New York. This provided ample opportunity for players to further develop their individual and team basketball fundamentals.

The club also supported the Ottawa Youth Basketball Academy where teams were fielded at U12 to U19 boy teams and a U19 girl team. A number of Nepean players participated on these teams. As well, a number of Nepean players participated on the Pre-JUEL and JUEL teams for Ottawa.

Accomplishments

Teams had great successes this season in both the EOBAs and OBAs. The following are the final Ontario rankings of the Competitive Teams:

Updates on Last Year's Goals and Recommendations

VP Elite Programs Report

Overview

The 2015-2016 season was year 3 of NBBA's venture into Elite Programming. The NBBA's Elite programming is provided in cooperation with the Ottawa Shooting Stars, Ottawa Guardsmen, and Goulbourn Hornets to provide a platform for Elite Competition through the Ottawa Youth Basketball Academy (OYBA). The OYBA is the NBBA programming for elite players.

OYBA:

The OYBA made great strides this year with increased programming from 3 teams in 2014-2015 season to 7 teams in the 2015-2016 season. With this growth the NBBA provided two coaches to this Elite Program, Jaime McLean and Patrick Sullivan. The OYBA teams (Ottawa Elite) compete in the Prestigious Canadian Youth Basketball League. The CYBL is where the Best teams in Canada Compete. This season's Teams:

- U14 Boys: Coach Aaron Blakely
- U15 Boys: Coach Jay Howden
- U16 Boys: Coach Patrick Sullivan
- U17 Boys: Coach Tony House

The OYBA teams all had successful seasons finishing their seasons in the top half of the CYBL this past season:

- U15 Boys: Currently sit in 10th having played the majority of the Top ranked teams

- U19 Women: Finished CYBL League play 1st, and Champions in the League Showdown



The Future:

Over the summer there will be a focus placed on coach development of OYBA Coaches, and will begin to transfer into OYBA Clubs Player and Coach Clinics looking to help develop players and coaches within our affiliates. This past season NBBA was not invited or included in any JUEL board meetings or long term planning. However, we were invited to planning meetings for the 2016-17 season. There is no positive progress to report in regards to NBBA's consideration in the Ottawa JUEL Franchise.



VP Membership

REGISTRAR

Overview

This year there were 738 players, 60 teams and 136* volunteers registered with the Nepean Blue Devils Basketball Association.

Of the 738 players, 335 were girls and 403 were boys. 560 of the registered players participated in Recreational or Developmental programs while 178 players participated in a club Competitive program.

The club offered 14 different programs ranging from Novice beginners (6&7 year olds) to a Juvenile program (16-18 year olds).

The OYBA Bantam Boys, OYBA Midget Boys, and OYBA Junior Girls also made use of the registration system however their numbers are not included in the totals above.

The registration system was opened on a priority basis for returning members from July 20, 2015 to August 7, 2015 and open to returning members and new members on August 8, 2015. The Bantam and Midget-aged rec/dev programs were almost completely full by August 8, 2015 and players were added to a wait-list. While we were able to increase some of the programs to allow for the waitlisted members we were unable to accommodate some waitlisted players in the following programs

- Novice Boys Beginner
- Novice Boys Intermediate
- Atom Boys Development
- Atom Girls Development
- Bantam Boys Development
- Bantam Girls Development
- Midget Boys Development
- Midget Girls Development
- Juvenile Boys Development
- Juvenile Girls Development

Once the players were registered in the club database, information was provided to club coaches and program coordinators for try-out and sort-out purposes. Once the teams were finalized the information



was fed back to the program coordinators and players and coaches and managers were assigned to teams within the registration system.

As the Comparison table on the following page indicates, some program registration numbers were up this season:

- Novice Beginner Girls
- Novice Intermediate Girls
- Novice Intermediate Boys
- Atom Boys Development
- Bantam Girls Development
- Bantam Boys Development
- Midget Boys Development
- Juvenile Girls Development
- Juvenile Boys Development

The Atom Girls Development and Midget Girls Development showed a slight drop in numbers. Overall, the number of players registered increased by 54 players over the previous year; due to an increase in the number of Recreational / Developmental players registered.

 - o Disable try-out registration for competitive try-outs after the start of try-outs
 - o Addition of wording to add Nepean Blue Devils to safe senders list
 - o Auto release from competitive program to recreational program
 - Removal of phone number as a required field for convenors
 - o Integration of a standard competitive team fee into the registration fee



VP Marketing & Communication

Overview

Throughout the 2015-16 season members were kept informed of NBBA news through regular email communications, web and social media updates. In addition to NBBA news, information related to the Ottawa Youth Basketball Academy (OYBA) programs, local events, basketball clinics and camps was also regularly shared.

Accomplishments

- 1. Regularly communicated news to the membership related to NBBA programs, registration, competitive tryouts, recreational program sort-outs, OYBA news, club and local events, basketball clinics and camps, etc.

VOLUNTEER COORDINATOR

Overview

During the 2015/2016 season, the NBBA had volunteers acting in volunteer positions as coaches, assistant coaches, and team managers.

Of the 136* volunteers, 124 were adult volunteers and 12 were junior coaches. This includes volunteers who registered in the NBBA database or who made contact.

Of the 124 adult volunteers, 84 had valid PRCs on file, and 40 did not have valid PRCs on file. 90 adult volunteers required follow up for their PRC (either a new volunteer or a returning volunteer who needed a new PRC).

Accomplishments

In the Fall of 2015, NBBA representatives and the Ottawa Police set up a kiosk at the Walter Baker Centre on a Sunday afternoon for 4 hours to allow volunteers to attend this session and have their PRC's processed. We received very positive feedback on this approach and the completed PRC total received increased from last year.

Goals and Recommendations

- Some suggestions and recommendations for next year include:
 - Plan the registration kiosk again this coming year
 - Communicate to our members that the completion of the PRC is mandatory for all volunteers working with children. Some volunteers are under the impression that they do not need a PRC because of their profession (ie. Teacher), however, the NBBA requires a copy on file.
 - Communicate to our members to register in our database.

SCORE-KEEPING PROGRAM

Overview

During the 2015/2016 season, the Nepean Blue Devils Basketball Association continued the program designed to educate, train, and mentor players from grades 9-12 as NBBA table officials in order to receive their community service hours. Any member of the NBBA was welcome to apply for this program.

The program was very well received during its 2014/2015 roll-out and the demand from the Association continues to grow. During the 2015/2016 year we received many requests for score-keepers and were unable to meet the demand and had to institute the following structure with respect to assigning volunteers

1st priority - midget division (both boys and girls) 2nd priority - atom division (both boys and girls) 3rd priority - bantam division

Accomplishments

In its first season 2014/2015, the program had 21 volunteer score-keepers before Christmas and ended with 32 score-keepers, while this year saw an increase to 26 volunteers.

Summary of hours earned

- 0-10 hours 10 volunteers
- 11-20 hours 6 volunteers
- 21-30 hours 3 volunteers
- 31 plus hours 7 kids
- Very positive feedback from players, coaches, and parents

Goals and Recommendations

- promote on the website and at the start of the season and in January as volunteers seemed to dwindle off after Christmas.
- Identify two or three members (Grade 10) currently in the score-keeping program to take on a leadership role and mentor the younger members
- offering to grade 8 students so that they are training a year before earning volunteer hours.
- Extend the invitation to join the program to non-NBBA player
